ETHNOMEDICINE IN INDIA AND AN APPROACH TOWARDS MEDICINAL ECOLOGY

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There is undeniable an interrelationship between the understanding of ethnomedicine that is a heritage from the long standing understanding of ecosystems and the older descriptive terms of medical practice. Oriental forms of traditional and folkloric uses of medicinal plants have been recorded since time immemorial in ancient texts like Rigveda and followed by historical texts in the Indian subcontinent.
